Stephen L. Pugsley, age 85, of Royal Oak, passed away October 30, 2017. He was born October 8, 1932 in Detroit to the late Donald and Doris Pugsley. Stephen was the beloved husband of the late Barbara for 37 years; proud father of Tom (Karen) Mercier, Susie Mercier, Joe (Kim) Mercier, the late Michael Pugsley and the late William Pugsley; dear father-in-law of Joyce Puglsey, loving grandfather of Matthew Pugsley, Jillian Pugsley, Peter Mercier and David Mercier; brother of Philip (Joanie) Pugsley; and dear uncle of several nieces and nephews and great nieces and nephews.

Stephen graduated from Lincoln High School, Ferndale, in 1950. He served in the U.S. Air Force for 4 years, during the Korean War. Stephen studied Fine Arts at the Detroit School of Arts and Crafts from 1955-1956. He started his career at Chrysler Missile and then worked for General Motors as a technical illustrator until he retired on May 1, 1995. Stephen also studied graphics and print making at the College of Creative Studies in 1975. His passions included lithography, painting, sketching and teaching others about art.
